#### President's Corner



Wells Barlow, Chapter President

If you haven't heard about the upcoming Presidential elections or the impending "sequestration" of the U.S budget I hope you have had a great vacation somewhere without any type of electronic "connection". Saturation

coverage seems to be the norm and it's found in and on every media outlet you can name; print, television, radio, text, e-mail, twitter, LinkedIn, Facebook, Pinterest .... just to name a few. Heated debate continues over the federal budget and there are continuous discussions about where the Defense industry might end up. There has been a general consensus that as we draw down our force structure overseas, the need for continued large scale investments in Defense may be a thing of the past. Never mind a National Strategy that indicates bad things are still a possibility in almost any corner of the world. The fact is our economy at home has taken a severe beating and the general public is more concerned about what is happening here in the United States than in some far off country that most Americans probably can't locate on a map!

Whatever side of the argument you may support, the need for a robust and flexible defense capability is paramount, even if it is somewhat smaller than what we have seen over the past decade or two. It may also be true that we may not need Brigades of MRAPs, Abrams Tanks or Bradley Fighting Vehicles but does that mean we fold up our tents and go home and ignore the reality of other belligerent nation-states? Personally I think not and as a nation we will determine the best balance of

land, sea and air forces necessary to support our National Strategy. The big question will be can we do it with a little common sense or will we get forced into a strictly political budget axe as represented by the Budget Control Act of 2011 (i.e. sequestration). Only time will tell but for all this instability there really is a bright spot in some corners of the defense industry. If you are in the business of C4ISR or more specifically Cyber and cyber-security, then you are probably in a very lucrative business space. A February 13 article in a Washington (D.C.) paper indicated that cyber-security is expected to be one of the few areas of defense that will increase in the coming years. Total spending on cyber-security will increase almost 9 percent over the next five years to about \$14 Billion in 2016 (Deltek Market Research). Any bets on what the general defense spending increases will be during the same period? That's one bet that I wouldn't take. Also just take a look at how the Services in general and the Army in particular have begun to respond to the cyber threat. Even though the Air Force and Navy have been focused in this area for a few years, the Army is quickly catching up with new career field designations, larger bonuses for working in cyber-security and a renewed emphasis on Information Operations. So all is not doom and gloom! I guess it just depends on whose foxhole you are looking from.

David Smith, USMC, Program Manager for Training Systems (PM TRASYS); CAPT William Reuter, USN, Naval Air Warfare Center Training Systems Division (NAWCTSD); and Col Marcus Boyd, USAF, Air Force Agency for Modeling and Simulation AFAMS. The speakers provided insights on the current activities and significant changes occurring within their organizations as well as within their respective services. Thursday Keynote speaker Mr. Chester Kennedy, VP Engineering LM Global Training and Logistics provided an Industry perspective to the challenges while Mr. Keith Masback, SEIS-Ret and President of the U.S. Geospatial Intelligence Foundation, provided an interesting perspective on conflicts throughout the world that will insure we are not able to disengage from overseas conflicts.

# AFCEA International and Chapter Scholarship Awards

The AFCEA Central Florida chapter presented seven scholarship awards to outstanding local students. Presiding over the June award ceremony Chapter President Wells Barlow oversaw the presentations. Four local high school students were granted individual \$1000 scholarships on behalf of the Gordon Sinclair Memorial Scholarship, two of whom were present. Each student intends to pursue scientific and engineering degrees in line with AFCEA's mission of supporting the Command, Control, Communications, Computers, Intelligence, Surveillance, and Reconnaissance (C4ISR) fields.

Also, the Chapter presented one Student with a scholarship for \$5,000 from AFCEA International focused on cyber. Two graduate students received awards from the AFCEA International Science, Technology, Engineering and Math (STEM) subjects Teacher Scholarship program. Both students, from the University of Central Florida were presented with \$5,000 checks. Each student will go on to pursue graduate courses preparing to teach STEM subjects in U.S. middle or secondary schools. In addition to the \$5,000 scholarship, each graduating AFCEA STEM Scholar can receive a \$1,000 AFCEA STEM Teaching Tools grant each year for three years if the recipient continues teaching a STEM subject.

#### **March Luncheon**

The Chapter hosted COL Mike Zarbo, the PEO STRI Project Manager for Instrumentation, Targets and Threat Simulators (PM ITTS) at its March luncheon. Appreciation was also expressed to COL Zarbo for his previous remarks to the chapter several years ago upon assuming his PM ITTS responsibilities when he provided a presentation on his previous assignment as the Assistant Secretary of the Army (Acquisition, Logistics and Technology) (ASA(ALT) forward deployed Senior Acquisition Corps Adviser to the U.S. Army Central Command (ARCENT) in Kuwait. PM ITTS provides centralized acquisition of the research, development, production and fielding of test assets and investments in support of full spectrum, developmental and operational testing for the U.S. Army. PM ITTS is the life cycle manager of major test instrumentation, aerial and ground targets, and threat simulators/systems, as well as manager of the operation and maintenance of targets and threats for developmental and operational test and evaluation (T&E). Additionally, PM ITTS is the executor for programs/funding of Army-led Office of Secretary of Defense (OSD) Central T&E Investment Program (CTEIP) initiatives and projects. Of particular interest to the AFCEA Orlando chapter C4I audience were ITTS/TSMO Threat Cyber activities: involvement in supporting Network Integration Evaluations and his Electronic Warfare (EW) Overview to include the new T&E/S&T Electronic Warfare (EW) Test Technology Area. It became readily apparent that PM ITTS is a dynamic organization executing a unique mission and is the only Army Project Manager aligned with the Test Community.

## **June Luncheon**

The Chapter hosted Col Marcus "Shaka" Boyd Commander, Air Force Agency for Modeling and Simulation (AFAMS) for its June luncheon. Col Boyd provided an insightful view of the Cyber Challenges being addressed by the *Air Force* M&S and Training community. He noted that it is essential to support the Joint Force

Commander in achieving military objectives by 1) "enabling the ability to determine the appropriate application of force to dominate the operational environment," 2) validating and equipping "Instilling confidence in how systems will perform in current and future mission environments;" and 3) effective employment "knowing the capabilities and limitations of the force to execute operational requirements, and adjusting TTP's to execute evolving operational missions. In effect the challenge is to provide the best training to the Cyber Network Ops community "by providing realistic threat emulations that interoperate with M&S Live -Virtual – Constructive (LVC) environments creating a simulated environment to exercise against, fight through, and adapt to current threats. A fusion of people, processes, and technology is paramount for mission success, and network defenders must be cognizant of: 1) their cyber security situational awareness, 2) understand the threats, 3) be aware of the kinds of attacks to expect over a given period of time, 4) how to recognize these attacks, 5) how to mitigate them, and 6) how to validate the mitigation action produced the desired result. Cyber Warriors must also comprehend the consequences of an attack well enough to know how critical the various system applications are, how sensitive the various kinds of information are, and what sort of security expenditures and actions are justifiable to protect these critical resources. Col Boyd also discussed the various cyber units under the 24th Air Force and how they utilize Cyber M&S assets/ranges for operational training. Other efforts are directed towards: 1) avoiding redundancy, 2) accurately representing cyber effects in concert with kinetic effects, 3) need for better, faster and streamlined acquisition processes, and 4) close collaboration with industry to insure Interoperability with other M&S tools on multiple security levels and networks.
